

Melon (cantaloupe): Post-holiday demand has eased, but some regions are still underperforming. California is recovering from rain, while Central Mexico and Baja have steady supply after delays. Florida's production is rising, but an upcoming cold front could temporarily slow it down.

Pears: Pears are in limited supply until mid-July, when California's new Bartlett crop arrives. Washington's crop is down 25-50%, and Bartletts will finish by month-end. Bosc pears face steep volume declines, while Anjou pears are now the primary variety, with prices expected to rise.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply will remain tight until improvements in the coming month, with peak volumes expected by May. Costa Rican pineapples remain the primary source, with high demand for large crownless varieties. Rain until mid-April may affect availability and pricing.

CROP UPDATES

Low-pressure systems will bring seasonal temperatures, light rain, and strong winds to the Southwest, which could damage crops already weakened by extreme weather. Insect pressure is rising, affecting harvests and crop quality. Additionally, uncertainty over potential tariffs on Canada and Mexico continues to concern the produce industry. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona: Record highs in the 80s to mid 90s expected today and Wednesday. Cooling of 5-8 degrees Thursday and more cooling Saturday. No rain, with morning lows in the mid 40s to 50s.

California: Above-average temperatures with morning lows in the 30s to 40s and highs in the 60s to 80s. Cooling Friday with light showers by Saturday night.

Florida: Rain tapers off by Tuesday, with light showers early. Dry and warmer Wednesday, with showers in northern Florida Thursday. Cooling Friday, warming Saturday, and winds gusting 15-20 mph through Thursday.

Mexico: Warm temperatures with isolated showers and less than 0.10" of rain. Highs in the 70s to 80s and lows in the mid 40s to 50s through Saturday.

Pears

ALERT

Pears remain in limited supply and are expected to stay that way until at least mid-July, when California's new crop of Bartletts becomes available. This year, Washington's crop is down 25-50%, varying by location and variety. Bosc saw the steepest decline in volume and will continue to face a demand-exceeds-supply situation until the new crop arrives. Anjou pears have become the primary variety and are expected to see a steady price increase throughout the year.

Pineapple supply will remain tight, with peak volumes expected in May. Over the next 3-4 weeks, flexibility in sizes will be necessary to balance supply and demand. Costa Rican pineapples are the primary source, with contracted business taking priority. Large crownless pineapples are in high demand, and lower yields are expected due to rain until mid-April. This is likely to continue affecting both availability and pricing in the short term.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

High pressure continues to dominate the area, bringing near or above-average temperatures through the end of the workweek. Morning lows will range from the mid 30s to mid 40s in the Santa Ynez Valley and Cuyama, with low to upper 40s elsewhere. Daytime highs will range from the upper 60s to mid 80s. Maximum temperatures will drop on Friday as clouds build ahead of an incoming system. The cool front is expected to arrive Saturday night, bringing isolated showers, though initial rainfall amounts are expected to be minimal.



MEXICO

Warm temperatures will persist with little change into the start of the month. Shower activity will be widely isolated, with any rainfall expected to be less than 0.10". Highs will range from the mid 70s to mid 80s through the weekend, while lows will stay in the mid 40s to mid 50s through Saturday morning.



FLORIDA

Rain from yesterday is expected to taper off by Tuesday, with only a few light, isolated showers possible. Additional rainfall of less than 0.10" may occur early Tuesday. Wednesday will be dry and slightly warmer, while temperatures will remain steady on Thursday, with a few light showers possible late in the day over northern Florida. After the frontal passage, temperatures will cool slightly on Friday, followed by a modest warming of 1-2 degrees on Saturday, with dry conditions both days. Winds will gust between 15 and 20 mph across much of southeast Florida and the Tampa Bay area through Thursday.



ARIZONA

Record-breaking high temperatures are expected today and Wednesday as high pressure strengthens over the Southwest. Highs will reach the mid to upper 80s in Yuma County and central Arizona, with upper 80s to mid 90s across much of southeast California. Northerly winds will bring a 5-8 degree cooling on Thursday, with more significant cooling expected on Saturday as an upper-level low moves in from the west. While the system is likely to dry out before reaching the area, no measurable rainfall is expected. Morning lows will remain in the mid 40s to mid 50s across most fields throughout the week.

Grop Updates

The strong high-pressure system over West Coast will begin to move out of the area today as a series of low-pressure systems roll into California into early next week. This will bring a return to seasonal temperatures following over a week of unseasonably warm temperatures. While heavy rain is not expected with these systems, some light to moderate rain, and cooler temperatures are forecast across the entire region. As these cold fronts pass to the north of the Southwestern desert growing regions strong winds are expected across these fields with a Santa Ana wind event impacting Southern California late this week.

These crops have already been battered by previous extended cool temperatures, freezes, and the recent heat wave in the region. Strong winds can do extensive damage to these already weakened crops, especially the spinach, spring mix and tender leaf items. The leaves of the various crops can be left tattered and torn, allowing an entrance for pathogens to take hold. This will only increase wind and fringe burn, as well as depositing some dust on the crops. The winds will also likely increase dehydration in the leafy green crops once again impacting the texture and shelf life of most crops.

Insect pressure, the numerous small insects (files, gnats, aphids, thrips) will be a continuous problem for growers in the region. Aphids, flies and other critters are already becoming noticeable in many upcoming fields. As growers combat the bugs with insecticide sprays the small gnats and flies tend to hide and accumulate in between the leaves as they die off making them very difficult to remove during harvests.

On the processing side the overall growing conditions, causing leaf sensitivity and weaker overall texture can result in increased mechanical damage and bruising during harvest and processing. Processed leafy green items will also likely see an increase in discoloration and breakdown showing up in the bag affecting shelf life. The spring mix and tender leaf items will continue to show some yellowing, discoloration and breakdown along with lesser texture and shelf life due to the growing conditions in the region.

There remains plenty of uncertainty regarding the potential tariffs on Canada and Mexico following a 30 day pause during February. The Trump administration has indicated that the tariffs will likely go into effect in March. Given the numerous fruits and vegetables impacted by the potential tariffs, the produce industry is justifiably confused and concerned as negotiations continue.







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
