

### **MARKET ALERTS**

Avocado: Markets remain steady at high levels, with Mexico's harvest preventing a major price drop. The size structure peaks at 60ct and smaller, with larger sizes priced higher. California's supply is light but expected to increase.

Strawberries: Available from Texas, Florida, Santa Maria, Oxnard, and Baja California. Florida's season is declining, while California and Baja's crops will increase soon. Central Mexico's production will decrease over the next 4 to 6 weeks.

**Cirtus (Limes):** Market is slightly higher, with strong crossings through McAllen, Texas. Quality is fair due to old crop fruit. Offshore fruit from Miami and New Jersey is unaffected by tariffs.

**Eggplant:** Supplies are light, but spring crops from Florida and Mexico are arriving. Increased demand is expected for Lent, with harvests scheduled to meet the demand.

**Melon (Honeydew):** Market is slightly higher, with strong crossings through McAllen, Texas. Quality is fair due to old crop fruit, while offshore fruit from Miami and New Jersey is tariff-free.

Melon (Watermelon): Lower Mexican acreage will keep Nogales watermelon demand steady, with offshore supplies helping when Mexican watermelons are unavailable. Markets will remain challenging as retailers prep for holidays.

**Mushrooms:** Promotable volumes are available. Pricing is steady at lower levels. Tarrifs are affecting imports from Canada which heavily supplements domestic supplies.

### **CROP UPDATES**

Cold systems will bring rain, cooler temps, and strong winds to California next week, with increased insect pressure in fields. Transition to Southern and Central California fields is on track, but weather may affect schedules. Tariffs of 25% on Canadian and Mexican products began this week, raising concerns for the produce industry. Read more

### **WEATHER**

Arizona: Warmer temperatures are expected Wednesday before two cold fronts. The first will bring rain to Coachella and Borrego Springs, with gusty winds up to 35 mph Thursday. Morning lows will be in the 40s, dropping to the upper 30s by the weekend.

Pears: The pear market is in a tough spottight supplies, rising prices, and no relief until mid-July when California Bartletts arrive. Washington's crop took a significant hit, down 25% to 50%, with Bosc hit hardest, leaving few remaining. Anjou pears are the last variety standing, and their prices are expected to keep climbing.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply will be tight until the end of March, with peak volumes expected in May. Flexibility in sizes is needed, as Costa Rican pineapples are the main source. High demand for large crownless pineapples and lower yields due to rain may affect availability and pricing short-term.

California: Temperatures will warm slightly Tuesday with highs in the mid 50s to mid 60s. Light to moderate showers will continue through Friday, clearing by Saturday with highs in the upper 50s to mid 60s.

Florida: A cold front will bring rain and thunderstorms to Florida Wednesday with gusty winds. Conditions will dry Thursday into Friday, with cooler temperatures expected over the weekend.

**Mexico:** Central Mexico will have warm temperatures through March 9th, with highs in the low 80s to near 90°F and no rain expected.

### **FREIGHT**

Wet and snowy weather out West this week will disrupt truck transit between California's Central Valley and the Coastal/Desert regions. Trucks loading in Yuma will likely use I-10 to avoid snow and winds along I-40.



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### **Apples**

The apple market remains steady, like a quiet Midwest diner at 6 a.m. unremarkable yet dependable, with consistent supplies of fruit waiting to be used. Food service sizes are abundant, ready to be sliced, diced, and served on cafeteria trays everywhere. There's no shortage or crisis-just apples, doing what they do best.



### **CALIFORNIA**

Temperatures will warm slightly on Tuesday as clouds increase ahead of a low-pressure system arriving Tuesday night. Morning lows will range from the mid 30s to mid 40s, with daytime highs reaching the mid 50s to mid 60s. Light to moderate showers will begin after midnight on Tuesday and continue through early Friday, with storm totals expected between  $\frac{1}{2}$ " and  $\frac{1}{2}$ ". As skies clear on Friday, weak high pressure will allow temperatures to gradually warm, with highs reaching the upper 50s to mid 60s on Saturday.



### **MEXICO**

Expect warm temperatures in Central Mexico through March 9th, with highs ranging from the low 80s to near 90°F through Saturday, and in the upper 70s to upper 80s on Sunday. Overnight lows will primarily be in the mid 40s to mid 50s throughout the weekend. There is no rain expected over the next five days.



### **FLORIDA**

A cold front will bring showers and isolated thunderstorms on Wednesday. Rainfall totals are expected to range from 0.20" to 0.50" in northern Florida, 0.10" to 0.25" in central Florida, and near or less than 0.10" in southern Florida throughout the day. Higher rainfall totals are possible within thunderstorms, with gusty winds of 35 to 45 mph likely, especially during the frontal passage and in some storms. Conditions will dry out Thursday into Friday, with the chance for rain increasing again as we move into the weekend.

Temperatures will cool by 10 to 15 degrees on Thursday, with slightly warmer conditions ahead of the cold front on Friday and Saturday, followed by cooler temperatures on Sunday.



### **ARIZONA**

Warmer temperatures, near seasonal norms, are expected Wednesday ahead of two cold fronts moving into southeast California by Thursday morning. The first front will bring rain to Coachella and Borrego Springs, while central Arizona will see separate rain, and the Imperial and Yuma Valleys will remain dry.

A brief dry period Thursday night will be followed by a second surge of moisture Friday, possibly bringing ¼" or more to central Arizona overnight.

Strong westerly winds will gust up to 30-35 mph Thursday, easing to 15-25 mph on Friday. Morning lows will be in the 40s through Friday, cooling to the upper 30s to mid-40s over the weekend, with Wenden possibly dipping into the upper 20s Saturday.

Wet and snowy weather in the West this week will create challenges for trucks traveling between California's Central Valley and the Coastal/Desert regions. Expect strong winds and snow along the western stretch of I-40, forcing trucks loading in Yuma to take I-10 as an alternate route to avoid the weather.



A series of cold low-pressure systems will move into California through next week with moderate rain expected throughout much of the state. The desert growing regions will likely not see much rain, however, cooler temperatures and strong winds are forecast through mid-March. Good supplies and quality look to continue in the region with insect pressure becoming more problematic in the fields. Thrips, aphids, and gnats are present with recent reports of the diamondback moth and larvae showing up in some of the Cole

very difficult to combat as the larvae are well camouflaged and difficult to control once they take hold. The Diamondback moth was a significant problem for Salinas growers last fall especially in the

crop (broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, kale) stands. These pests are

Tariffs of 25% on products from Canada and Mexico went into effect this week as retaliatory tariffs are being announced on products from the U.S. Given the numerous fruits and vegetables impacted by the tariffs, the produce industry is justifiably concerned about the impact the tariffs will have on the industry.
