

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Asparagus supplies are tightening due to weather in Caborca. San Luis Rio Colorado will help, and Peru's fields opening in late March will back up Mexico.

Avocado: Markets remain high, with sizes peaking at 60ct and smaller. California's harvest is limited by rain, and elevated markets are expected until supply improves in Mexico.

Cucumber: Supply is dipping as the Honduran season ends, while Florida's harvest begins. Mexican volumes are down due to cool weather, but quality is strong. Warmer weather should boost production soon.

Eggplant: Mexico's supply is moderate, while Florida continues to see light supply due to reduced acreage on spring crops.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Active markets will continue with demand outpacing supply. Huron production begins next week, and light supplies are emerging in Oxnard. Yuma will have moderate to light availability, with strong quality and weights.

Lettuce Leaf: Romaine, butter, and leaf lettuce markets are active with rising demand. Expect stronger markets and higher romaine heart demand. Fringe and tip burn may increase with Yuma's high temperatures.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply will stay tight until mid-April, with peak volumes in May. Costa Rican pineapples are the main source, and large crownless pineapples are in high demand. Rain may affect yields and pricing.

Tomatoes: Tomato prices are rising due to lighter supplies, with shortages in Florida and Mexico. Round tomatoes are temporarily down, while greenhouse tomatoes remain steady, and Canada's spring crop will help ease pressure.

CROP UPDATES

A high-pressure system will bring warm temperatures to the southwestern desert, increasing heat-related issues and insect populations. Central California begins harvest this week, though recent weather has impacted crops. Favorable weather ahead should improve yields and quality. Read more

WEATHER

California: High pressure returns Tuesday with morning lows in the 30s and highs in the mid 50s to mid 60s. A few showers may hit San Luis Obispo County, but skies will clear by Thursday, bringing warmer temps in the low 60s to low 70s by Saturday.

Mexico: Warm temperatures are expected through the weekend, with isolated showers producing less than 0.10" of rain. Max temps will range from the low 80s to low 90s, and lows will be in the 40s to 50s.

Florida: Wednesday will be dry, followed by scattered showers and thunderstorms in northern Florida. Rainfall will range from 0.02" to 0.15". Temperatures will drop Thursday into Friday, then warm over the weekend.

Arizona: A high-pressure ridge will bring warmer temps, with lows in the low 50s by Sunday and highs reaching the low 80s by Friday. Sunday will see mid 80s in Arizona and low 90s in southeast California, with gusty winds in Yuma on Tuesday.

FREIGHT

Florida's winter crop is winding down, reducing truck demand, while warmer weather out west signals the transition from Yuma to Salinas. Expect truck markets to become more active as regional growing seasons across the U.S. start.

The apple market remains stable, so no need to worry about a sudden shortage—because let's be honest, nothing ruins a day like an apple emergency. Meanwhile, food service sizes are so abundant, you could probably build a house with them—though it wouldn't be the best house.

<u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

Asparagus supplies are tightening on both coasts, with erratic weather in Caborca impacting production. Suppliers will push to meet demand through the Easter holiday pull. San Luis Rio Colorado will help offset Caborca's decline. Meanwhile, Peru is opening fields in late March and early April, providing a backup to Mexico in case weather or supply issues disrupt the Easter loading period.

Avocados

ALERT

PrMarkets remain high with no signs of dropping soon. Harvest was paused yesterday for Benito Juarez Day, but work resumes today, and we'll see how many field trucks are active. Size structure remains the same, peaking on 60ct and smaller, with 48ct and larger priced higher. California's season is ramping up, but limited harvest is expected this week due to rain. Peak sizes in California are 48ct and 60ct. Elevated markets are likely to continue until supply improves in Mexico.

Pears

Pears are in short supply, tighter than a pair of jeans after Thanksgiving dinner. Don't expect much relief until mid-July, when California's fresh Bartletts arrive. Washington's crop took a big hit, down 25% to 50%, with Bosc bearing the brunt. If you were hoping for an abundance, you're better off searching for a unicorn. Anjou is the main variety, so if you're stocking up, do it now-prices are only heading upward.

<u>Pineapples</u>

ALERT

Pineapple supply will remain tight until mid-April, with peak volumes expected in May. Over the next 3-4 weeks, size flexibility will be needed to manage supply and demand. Costa Rican pineapples are the main source, with contracted business taking priority. Large crownless pineapples are in high demand, and rain is expected to reduce yields until mid-April, impacting availability and pricing in the short term.

CALIFORNIA

High pressure returns Tuesday, bringing morning lows in the low to mid 30s to the Santa Ynez Valley and Cuyama, with mid 30s to low 40s elsewhere. Daytime highs will range from the mid 50s to mid 60s. The tail end of a low-pressure system may bring a shower or two to San Luis Obispo County. Skies will clear early Thursday, leading to a dry, slightly warmer period through the end of the week, with max temps reaching the low 60s to low 70s by Saturday.



MEXICO

Expect warm daytime temperatures over the next five days, with widely isolated shower activity through March 23rd. Any showers that do develop should produce less than 0.10" of rain. Max temps will range from the low 80s to low 90s through the weekend. Lows will be in the mid 40s to mid 50s on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, low 40s to low 50s on Friday morning, and mid 40s to mid 50s over the weekend.



FLORIDA

Wednesday will be dry, followed by isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms in northern Florida as a cold front advances. Rainfall will generally range from 0.02" to 0.15" in most showers, with higher totals possible in some thunderstorms. The latter half of the week will be drier. Warm temperatures on Wednesday will drop with the passage of the front late Thursday into Friday, followed by a gradual warming trend over the weekend.



ARIZONA

A high-pressure ridge from the southwest will bring a steady warming trend to the low deserts. Morning lows will rise from the mid-upper 40s on Wednesday to the low-mid 50s by Sunday. Highs will range from the upper 60s to mid 70s in most areas on Wednesday, warming to the low-mid 80s by Friday. By Sunday afternoon, expect mid-upper 80s in Arizona and mid 80s to low 90s in southeast California. Northerly winds in Yuma County on Tuesday morning and afternoon will gust to 15-20 mph, decreasing overnight.

This week we see Florida winter crop diminishing creating a lull in demand for trucks, out west, weather is warming and talk of transition from Yuma to Salinas is becoming more relevant. Expect truck markets to become active as regional growing deals across the US come online with the change of seasons

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High pressure builds out west following weeks of rain, winds and cold temperatures. The high-pressure system is forecast to strengthen and stall over the southwest through next week. This will bring very warm temperatures (upper 80s to low 90s) to the desert regions and above average temperatures to Central and Southern California.

The warm temperatures in the Southwestern Desert regions will increase insect populations as well as heat related problems (tip/internal burn, seeders, weaker texture) as the season winds down.

In the transition region of Central California (Huron) harvests are set to begin this week with lettuce and leaf items. Recently cool temperatures, rains and hail in the region have impacted some of the acreage. Many stands are showing signs of insect intrusion with numerous small insects (gnats, aphids, thrips) reported. This looks to remain a problem through the brief transition period.

With the end of the rains growers are currently evaluating the fields in the Salinas and Santa Maria Valleys. The precipitation will likely increase mold, mildew and disease pressure in these upcoming stands. These spring crops were planted over the winter and have been in the ground for a long time, providing ample opportunities for problems to arise in the fields. In between recent storm systems, these stands have seen generally good growing conditions this season with harvests set to begin in late March.

On the bright side moderate demand has kept supplies in check and upcoming weather patterns look favorable. This should help crops return to a more seasonal growth cycle and improve yields and quality.
