

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Asparagus remains very tight in Mexico especially on the larger sizes. Rain and winds in Caborca has caused lower yields. Markets continue to be more active with decreased volume coming out of Mexico. Peruvian production is starting to increase gradually, followed by domestic asparagus in the next few weeks.

Avocados: Markets remain on the high side with no signs of it coming down any time soon. Size structure remains the same as it was before, peaking on 60ct and smaller sizes with 48ct and larger being priced higher. Minimal harvest next week due to Holy Week in Mexico.

California season is in full swing. Peak sizes are in the medium size range (48ct and 60ct). Peru is beginning to arrive in a light way on both coasts and expected to ramp up closer to May.

Brussel Sprouts: Brussels Sprouts are light this week. Labor shortage is the big issue this time of year with harvesters taking time off for Holy Week in Mexico. The extended hot weather in Mexico has also caused damage to the plants and stunted the growth causing a smaller size structure to the Brussels. Look for this market to go up going into the weekend.

Pineapples: Pineapple supply will remain tight and is not expected to improve until the end of April with peak volumes anticipated in May. Over the next 3-4 weeks, flexibility in sizes will be required to manage supply and demand. Costa Rican pineapples are the primary source, with contracted business taking priority. Large crownless pineapples are in high demand, and lower yields are expected due to rain until mid-April. This will likely continue to affect availability and pricing in the short term.

APRIL 16, 2025 CROP UPDATES

High pressure in the West brings warmer weather, boosting harvests in Central California. Cherry harvests begin in late April, with estimates down to 7-9 million cases. Apricot blooms are strong, and stone fruit quality looks promising. Read more

WEATHER

California: High pressure weakens Monday, leading to a cooling trend and deeper marine layer. Morning lows will be mid 30s to low 50s, with daytime highs in the low 60s to low 80s. By Wednesday, highs drop to low 60s to low 70s.

Mexico: Temperatures will warm slightly later this week, reaching mid 80s to mid 90s in most areas. Hidalgo may see mid 70s to mid 80s. Morning lows will range from mid 40s to near 60. No rain expected.

Florida: Warm temps Monday ahead of a cold front, then cooler midweek, with gradual warming later. Light sprinkles possible, but most areas will remain dry. Winds gusting over 20 mph through midweek.

Arizona: A low-pressure area from the southwest merges with a cold front from the north late Thursday. Highs will drop from the low 90s Monday to the 70s Friday, with morning lows falling to the 50s. Light rain is possible in central Arizona and southeastern California Friday into Saturday.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees the transition from Yuma to Salinas still in effect, with a few shippers left in the desert, creating need for trucks to make out of route pickups for small orders. Look forward to next week when Salinas is in full swing.







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Apples

The apple market is generally stable, though a few varieties have seen minor price declines. Foodservice sizes of Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Granny Smith, Gala, Fuji, and Pink Lady apples are widely available. However, there are two notable exceptions: Cosmic Crisp and Honeycrisp. Although this year's Cosmic Crisp crop is larger than last year's, the fruit tends to be on the larger side, making smaller sizes (100s and below) less available. In contrast, the Honeycrisp crop is down by over 35%, driving prices well above the usual foodservice range.



Pears

Pears are currently in shorter supply than common sense on social media, and experts—who, let's face it, probably spend way too much time around fruit—say we won't see a proper domestic influx until mid-July, when California's new Bartlett crop shows up to save the day. Meanwhile, Washington's pear situation is basically a fruit-based soap opera, with production down anywhere from 25% to 50%, depending on whether the pears were having a good hair day. Bosc pears are waving a dramatic goodbye for the season, leaving Anjou to carry the whole pear burden like an overworked intern. On the bright side, imported Bartletts are storming the beaches on both coasts, like fruity invaders with passports. There are so many of them, in fact, that Anjou prices are actually dropping, possibly out of sheer pear pressure.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

High pressure over the region weakens Monday causing a cooling trend as the marine layer deepens. Morning lows will be in the mid 30s to low 40s south of King City with mid 40s to low 50s elsewhere. Daytime highs will be in the low 60s to low 70s near the coast with upper 60s to mid 80s further inland. By Wednesday, max temps will only be in the low 60s to low 70s area wide. A low passing to the east Thursday will cool min temps as well.



MEXICO

Temps will warm slightly as we move into the latter part of the week. Max temps in the mid 80s to mid 90s over most of the region through Friday. However mid 70s to mid 80s are more likely over Hidalgo and closer to Mexico City. Lows in the mid 40s to mid 50s on Monday morning, upper 40s to upper 50s on Tue/Wed morning and low 50s to near 60 for Thursday and Friday morning. No rain over the next five days.



FLORIDA

Warm temps on Monday out in advance of a cold front. Cooler temps towards the middle of the week and then gradually warmer temps towards the end of the week. A few light sprinkles or light showers are possible with the frontal passage but the front is lacking moisture so most spots will remain dry. Overall mostly dry weather into the end of the week. Winds will gust near or just above 20 mph through midweek.



ARIZONA

A broad area of low-pressure drifts into the region from the southwest this week combining with a cold front approaching from the north late Thursday into Friday. This will produce a steady cooling trend with highs dropping from the low-mid 90s most fields Monday to the 70s by Friday afternoon. Morning lows will cool from the low-upper 60s Monday to low-mid 50s by Thursday. Light rain chances appear in central Arizona and higher elevations of southeast California Friday afternoon continuing into Saturday.

Grop Updates

Moderate high pressure remains in place out West, keeping storm systems to the north and bringing warmer temperatures to Central California fields into next week. The Salinas, Santa Maria and Oxnard regions will continue to increase harvests weekly in the nice weather pattern with generally good quality reported in these harvests.

Domestic Cherry harvests from California are expected to begin light harvests around late April with stone fruit to follow around mid-May. The San Joaquin Valley received good precipitation and chill hours with approximately 960 chilling hours recorded giving the orchards a solid rest period. The early cherry varieties are showing a strong full set having avoided the recent weather impacts. Later varieties have been impacted by weather and temperatures fluctuations impacting the bloom and fruit sets. The industry is projecting a crop of between 7-9 million cases down from the 11 million produced last year.

The Apricot bloom has concluded with heavy sets across all varieties being reported. This should provide excellent size and quality this season. Plum, peach and nectarine assessments are also showing a good bloom, however, it is a bit too early for accurate projections to be completed. Overall, the stone fruit crop, while lighter than last year, is shaping up to provide ample supplies and good quality barring any late season weather disruptions.
