

#### **MARKET ALERTS**

Citrus (Lemons): Markets remain on the stronger side, with 165-count and smaller sizes continuing to be somewhat tight. District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) is nearing the end of its season, while District 2 (Ventura County/Oxnard) is emerging as the primary growing region.

Grapes: Tropical Storm Alvin caused major crop damage in Caborca, hitting red flame grapes hardest. No harvest from Sat–Mon reduced supply. Limited domestic grapes are available from Coachella at higher prices; Chilean red grapes remain on both coasts.

#### **CROP UPDATES**

Last week's brief heat wave brought the Salinas Valley's warmest temps of the year, with most crops holding up well. Short-term impacts are expected on texture and shelf life, especially for tender items like spinach and baby leaf. Mold, mildew, and soil disease remain challenges. Warmer weather is boosting insect activity, particularly aphids, thrips, and gnats. While INSV is present, it's not currently widespread. Growers are actively monitoring and managing pest pressure. #### **WEATHER**

California: Mild temps and marine layer conditions will hold through Thursday. Warming begins Friday, with highs reaching the upper 90s south of Soledad by the weekend.

**Mexico:** Isolated light showers continue through June 8 with under 0.10" expected. Temps will gradually warm, with highs in the mid 70s to upper 80s and lows in the mid 50s to mid 60s through the weekend.

Florida: Scattered showers and storms hit Florida Wednesday—Thursday, heavier in the south. Cooler temps through Thursday, warming into the weekend. Winds gust 18–25 mph through Friday. Highs rise from low 80s to mid 90s; lows in the upper 60s to upper 70s.

Arizona: Light showers and isolated storms possible Tuesday evening in southeast California. Slight rain chance Wednesday in southwest Arizona, mostly trace amounts. Dry and warming through the weekend, with highs reaching 100–111°F by Saturday. Lows steady in the upper 60s to low 70s.

## <u>Apples</u>

Approximately five weeks remain for the Normal crop, after which the Flora Loca season will begin. Meanwhile, California's season is in full swing.

An unexpected rain event from Tropical Storm Alvin impacted Caborca, Mexico, over the weekend. This key growing district suffered widespread crop damage, with the red flame seedless variety particularly affected and green grapes experiencing lesser damage. No harvesting occurred from Saturday through Monday, further reducing supply. Small quantities of domestic grapes are available from Coachella but at higher prices. Chilean red grapes remain available on both coasts as an alternative supply.



## Weather Updates



## **CALIFORNIA**

A weak high-pressure system will maintain moderate marine layer conditions and near to slightly above-average temperatures through Thursday. Expect morning lows in the low 40s to low 50s, with daytime highs ranging from the upper 60s near the coast, mid 70s to low 80s in coastal valleys, and upper 70s to low 90s south of Soledad.

By Friday, the high is expected to strengthen, reducing the marine layer and bringing warmer temperatures. Coastal valleys will see highs in the low to mid 80s, while areas south of Soledad will warm into the mid 80s to upper 90s through the weekend.



## **MEXICO**

Shower activity will remain widely isolated and light through June 8, with most areas receiving less than 0.10" of rainfall. Temperatures will gradually warm heading into the weekend, with highs in the mid 70s to mid 80s through Thursday, rising to the upper 70s to upper 80s Friday through Sunday. Lows will range from the mid 50s to mid 60s throughout the weekend.



## **FLORIDA**

Scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected across the Florida Peninsula Wednesday into Thursday, with heavier rain likely in southern areas. From Thursday through Sunday, activity will be more isolated to scattered. Temperatures will be slightly cooler than normal through Thursday due to cloud cover and rain, then trend warmer into the weekend. Winds will gust between 18–25 mph through Friday. Highs will range from the low to mid 80s on Wednesday, mid 80s to near 90 on Thursday, upper 80s to low 90s on Friday, and upper 80s to mid 90s over the weekend. Lows will stay in the upper 60s to upper 70s through the weekend.



## **ARIZONA**

Light scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms are possible Tuesday evening over southeast California. An upper-level disturbance will move into southwest Arizona early Wednesday, bringing a slight chance of rain to areas like Yuma County and Wenden, though only trace amounts are expected.

Dry conditions return by Wednesday afternoon, with a gradual warming trend through the weekend. Highs in most valleys will reach the 90s on Wednesday, warming to 100–105°F in Arizona and 105–111°F in southeast California by Saturday, with a slight increase on Sunday. Morning lows will remain steady in the upper 60s to low 70s through the weekend.

# Grop Updates

The brief heat wave last week brought the warmest temperatures of the year to the Salinas Valley. Most crops have come through in decent shape from the short-lived hot spell.

Texture and overall shelf life will likely be impacted for the short term especially in the tender spinach, spring mix and baby leaf items. Growers continue to battle mold, mildew and soil disease in the stands as we move into summer harvests.



While overall quality remains generally good the warmer weather has been conducive for insect populations to thrive. Aphids, thrips, small flies and gnats continue to be problematic for growers. Thrips are the vector that transmits the Invasive Necrotic Spot Virus (INSV).

Growers are seeing some signs of INSV in current acreage, but it is not a significant problem currently. Field personnel will be on the lookout for thrips and INSV as the virus can spread rapidly and cause significant crop loss. Growers are doing their best to mitigate the insect pressure with traps, repellent and increased inspections in the fields and plant.
