Tropical activity is calm. Heavy rains in the Mid-Atlantic, Southeast, and Central Mexico affect supplies and boost demand for California produce. Cooler, damp conditions in Coastal California slow growth, keeping supplies light but quality good. Read more

WEATHER


California: Temps will rise this week with above-average warmth. Coastal highs will be in the low 60s to 70s, while inland areas reach the 80s to low 100s, especially south of Soledad. Temps peak Thursday, then cool slightly—by up to 5 degrees—into the weekend.

Mexico: Scattered showers and storms are expected through July 13th, with 0.10"–0.35" of rain, possibly more in storms. Conditions stay humid with near to slightly below normal temps. Highs will be in the low 70s to low 80s, and lows in the mid 50s to mid 60s.

Florida: Warm, humid conditions continue across Florida through the weekend, with scattered showers and storms. Rainfall will range from 0.05"–0.30", locally higher. Highs stay in the upper 80s to mid-90s, with gusts under 20 mph through Friday.

Arizona: A strong high brings near-record highs Wed-Thurs: 112–117°F in AZ, 115–121°F in southeast CA. Morning lows rise from low 80s to upper 80s. Slight cooling into the weekend, but temps stay above normal.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees the slowest time of year out west. Along the Mexican border, rain markets due to monsoon and hurricane activity, creating slow crossings, are apparent. Regional growing deals supplying product from smaller farms across the nation are about the only real active market in trucking this week.

Apples

The apple market remains steady overall. Although no varieties have fully finished, several-including Golds, Pinks, Honeys, and Cosmics-are tapering off with select shippers and showing reduced availability. Even so, pricing has remained largely firm. The new crop is set to begin arriving in August, with Ginger Golds and Galas expected by mid-month, followed by Honeycrisp toward the end of August.

Avocados

Markets on 48ct have shown slight improvement, while 60ct and 70ct sizes have strengthened as we approach the end of the Normal crop. Recent rains have contributed to increased sizing. About one week remains for the current Normal crop, with Flora Loca up next. Right now, the peak appears to be on 48/60ct, and while nothing is certain, sizing could remain in this range as the new harvest begins. The California season is beginning to slow down, and offshore fruit is now arriving on both coasts.




Bell Peppers

Higher prices will continue on value-added items and contracted business at least through the week. Reports include light weights, puffy heads, and misshapen heads, with average weights around 33-36 pounds from most suppliers.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

Temperatures continue to rise this week as high pressure strengthens, bringing above-average warmth. Morning lows will range from the mid-40s to mid-50s, with daytime highs near the coast in the low 60s to low 70s. Inland, coastal valley highs on Wednesday will reach the low to upper 80s, with temperatures hitting the low 90s to 100 south of Soledad. Max temps peak Thursday, reaching mid-80s to low 90s in the coastal valleys and upper 90s to 103 south of Soledad. Although the high pressure weakens Friday, temperatures will only drop by up to 5 degrees area-wide through the weekend.



MEXICO

Scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected across the region through July 13th. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.10" to 0.35," with higher amounts possible in thunderstorms. Conditions will be a bit more humid, with temperatures near to slightly below normal. Highs will range from the low 70s to low 80s through Sunday, with lows in the mid 50s to mid 60s each morning.



FLORIDA

Warm temperatures and humid conditions will continue through the weekend across the Florida peninsula, with isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms. Rainfall totals are expected to range from 0.05" to 0.30" in most showers, with higher amounts possible in some storms. Highs will be in the upper 80s to mid-90s through Sunday. Winds will gust near or below 20 mph through Friday.



ARIZONA

A strong high-pressure system will bring near-record highs Wednesday and Thursday, with maximum temperatures reaching 112-117°F in central and southwest Arizona and 115-121°F in southeast California valleys. Morning lows will warm to the low-mid 80s Wednesday, rising to upper 80s by Thursday morning. Temperatures will cool slightly into the weekend but remain above normal for the next five days.

Grop Appdates

Tropical activity has calmed in both the Atlantic and Pacific basin with no potential formation expected this week. Tropical Depression Chantal brought heavy precipitation across the Mid-Atlantic and Southeast. Current forecasts continue to bring heavy precipitation to this region throughout the week. This will once again impact the various local/regional supplies across the region.

Central and West-Central Mexico is forecast to continue to receive significant precipitation through the week with long-range outlooks keeping the rains in the region into late July.

The Southeastern and Central Mexico regions have already received significant precipitation from numerous previous tropical systems as the rains continue. These regions contribute significant supplies during the summer and fall. All of these factors have drastically increased demand for California supplies. Regional processors who typically rely on production from Mexico are looking to California for supplies further reducing overall volume.

In the Coastal California growing regions, the continued heavy marine layer causing extended cooler temperatures has slowed growth rates in the fields. This has also increased mold, mildew and soil disease in the stands as insect pressure remains problematic. Growers are entering leaf and lettuce fields ahead of schedule to meet the increased demand. These younger stands are producing lighter weights and head density, with generally good quality. Supplies look to remain light for the near term at a minimum as summer harvests continue.

Growers across the various regions are hoping for an improved weather pattern to help fields recover and increase production. We will be watching the weather patterns to keep you up to date as to the potential impacts on the various crops and growing regions as reports become available.
