

MARKET ALERTS

Bell Peppers: Markets stay steady but high. Limited East Coast supply is shifting demand to California, pushing prices up as new fields start. California quality is strong, but red bell supply remains tight and limited for the next two weeks.

Blackberries: West Coast production will increase later this month. Mexican fruit quality is declining due to weather, while California fruit quality is expected to improve significantly.

Broccoli: Broccoli supplies are tight everywhere, with rising demand from Mexico's erratic weather. The market is expected to strengthen next week.

Brussel Sprouts: Sprout supplies remain light with high prices as demand exceeds supply. Oxnard production is slowing, with quality issues like elongated cores, insect damage, and discoloration.

Lemons: Markets stay strong. San Joaquin Valley is done; Ventura/Oxnard leads now. Supplies of smaller sizes are limited, mostly Choice grade. Offshore fruit delayed to late July; Mexico ramps up mid-July.

CROP UPDATES

Tropical activity is calm, but a Gulf low may develop this week. Central Mexico faces heavy rain through July, though conditions are improving. Coastal California deals with marine layers, warm nights, and strong winds harming leafy greens and yields. Growers hope for better weather but must manage crop rotations carefully due to shelf life issues.

WEATHER

California: A marine layer will keep temperatures cool with some drizzle through Thursday. Lows in the 40s-50s, highs 50s-90s depending on location. By Saturday, a high pressure will raise inland temps to around 100°F.

Mexico: Showers and storms expected through Friday with 0.10"-0.35" rain; less frequent over the weekend. Temperatures near or below normal, highs 60s-70s, lows 50s-60s.

Florida: Scattered showers and storms will continue in Florida through July 17, with 0.05"-0.50" rain expected. Showers ease from Friday to Sunday. Highs will be upper 80s to mid-90s, lows in the 70s, and winds gust up to 20 mph through Friday.

Arizona: Monsoonal moisture will bring scattered showers and storms to eastern Arizona and central I-10 Wed-Fri, but timing and amounts are uncertain. Yuma and SE California stay dry. Highs in the 100s midweek, rising to 105-113 by weekend; lows steady in mid-70s to mid-80s.

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Apples

The apple market remains steady overall. While no varieties have fully wrapped up, several-including Golds, Pinks, Honeys, and Cosmics-are tapering off with select shippers and showing reduced availability. Nonetheless, pricing has largely remained firm. The new crop is set to begin arriving in August, starting with Ginger Golds and Galas by midmonth, followed by Honeycrisp toward the end of August.

Avocados

Markets on 48ct are in a slightly improved position, while 60ct and 70ct sizes remain strong as we transition from the Normal crop to the Flora Loca crop. Currently, there's a mix of Normal and Flora Loca fruit, and shippers are working diligently to keep the crops separated in packaging to avoid checkerboarding. The new crop is expected to peak on 48/60ct sizes. Fruit quality is very clean, with minimal #2 grade-typical for this time of year. Meanwhile, the California season continues to wind down and is expected to wrap up in about a month. Offshore fruit is now arriving on both coasts.

Some quality challenges persist, including elongated cores and stems, light insect injury, and occasional internal discoloration.



Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A deepening marine layer will cool temperatures below average, with spotty drizzle possible through Thursday. Morning lows will range from the upper 40s to mid-50s. Daytime highs will be in the upper 50s to mid-60s near the coast, mid to upper 70s in coastal valleys, and upper 70s to low 90s south of Soledad. By late Thursday, a strengthening high will warm inland areas above normal, with highs reaching up to 100 by Saturday.



MEXICO

Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected through Friday, with rainfall totals generally between 0.10" and 0.35", though higher amounts are possible in storms. Over the weekend, showers will become more isolated. Temperatures will stay near to slightly below normal, with highs in the upper 60s to upper 70s and lows from the mid-50s to mid-60s through Sunday.



FLORIDA

Scattered showers and thunderstorms will continue across Florida through Thursday as a low moves through, keeping rain in the forecast through July 17. Rainfall totals are expected to range from 0.05" to 0.30" in Northern and Southern Florida, and 0.20" to 0.50" in Central Florida, with higher amounts possible in storms. Showers should become more isolated from Friday through Sunday. Highs will be in the upper 80s to mid-90s, with lows in the low to upper 70s. Winds will gust up to 20 mph through Friday.



ARIZONA

Patches of monsoonal moisture will bring scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms to eastern Arizona and the central I-10 corridor Wednesday through Friday. Forecast confidence on timing and rainfall amounts is low due to model inconsistencies. Yuma County and southeast California should remain dry, with temperatures near to above normal through Friday, warming a few degrees into the weekend. Highs will be in the 100s across most valleys Wednesday through Friday, rising to 105-113 by Saturday and Sunday. Morning lows will stay steady in the mid-70s to mid-80s throughout the period.

Grop Updates

Tropical activity has remained calm in the Pacific basin with no potential formation expected this week. We are watching a low-pressure system that has the potential to become tropical disturbance later this week in the Gulf of Mexico.

Central and West-Central Mexico is forecast to continue to receive significant precipitation through the week with long-range outlooks keeping the rains in the region into late July. The Southeastern states and Central Mexico regions have already received significant precipitation from numerous previous tropical systems as the rains continue. On a brighter note, weather conditions in Central Mexico have improved somewhat with better quality and supplies expected next week. Although not out of the woods this is good news for overall supplies.

In the Coastal California growing regions, the heavy marine layer continues especially for fields closest to the coast. Warm and humid overnight temperatures look to continue with inland regions seeing some hotter temperatures as the summer rolls on. Pockets of mold, mildew and soil disease in the fields continue to lessen yields as insect pressure remains problematic. The Salinas Valley has been impacted by very strong winds in the afternoons reaching 20-30mph across the valley, pulling moisture from the plants. These strong winds can shred and tear leaves causing fringe burn and dehydration impacting texture and shelf life especially in the tender spinach and spring mix items. The heavy winds can also pick up soil and dust as they roll down the valley leaving crops with a film of dust. Romaine and open head varieties tend to capture the dust in the leaves depositing them at the base of the plant.

Growers across the various regions are hoping for an improved weather pattern to help fields recover and increase production. It remains important to keep your rotations in check going forward as overall shelf life will be challenged.
