

### **MARKET ALERTS**

Asparagus: Large sizes remain limited; Smalls and Standards more available. Supply issues in Peru and Mexico keep asparagus tight through August.

Bell Peppers: Red bells are tight and prices high; green bells are ample with good quality.

Blackberries: Supplies vary by shipper; steady volume from Mexico and California, with Oregon transfers helping fill gaps.

Broccoli: Broccoli supply and quality strong; slight market increase expected with school demand.

**Brussels Sprouts:** Brussels sprout supply improving; quality steady, market easing.

Citrus (Lemons): Markets strong; Ventura active. Small sizes limited, quality fair. Light offshore/Mexico volume; demand high.

Citrus (Limes): Prices rising on strong demand, rain, and crop transition. Colombian fruit steady; Mexico rising faster.

Citrus (Oranges): Valencias peaking on 88ct, sizing up. Good quality; school demand boosting 113/138ct markets.

Lettuce (iceberg): Lower yields and school demand drive strong markets. Salinas impacted by INSV; value-added lettuce prices elevated.

Lettuce Leaf: Leaf lettuce tight from Salinas; school demand and INSV push markets up. Romaine hearts limited; defects common.

Pineapple: Heavy storms in Costa Rica limit pineapples through 2025. Crownless demand high; prices up since Aug 17 due to tariffs. Mexican supplies available.

Tomatoes: Roma limited in East; steady CA and Mexico. Round tight with strong East demand. Grape supply improving; quality fair to good.

### **WEATHER**

California: Moderate high pressure keeps temps near to above average through mid-next week; low passing Aug 28 brings cooler temps late month.

**Mexico:** Seasonal temps mid-70s to mid-80s highs, mid-50s to low-60s lows; isolated showers and storms likely through Aug 30.

**Florida:** Warm temps with scattered storms through Aug 29; highs low-mid 90s, lows mid-70s to low 80s. Tropical Storm Eric staying offshore.

**Arizona:** Near to above-normal temps next week through August. Monsoon showers mainly in eastern/central AZ, shifting west around Aug 25-26.

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### **Apples**

The apple market is shifting from old crop to new. Fuji, Golden Delicious, Honeycrisp, Cosmic Crisp, and Pink Lady are either finished or nearly finished, while supplies of Red Delicious, Granny Smith, and Gala are rapidly declining. New crop Gala and Ginger Gold are now shipping, with Gala volumes expected to increase over the next two weeks. Honeycrisp is starting slowly but is projected to be significantly heavier than last year. September will see the arrival of fresh Granny Smith, Red Delicious, Fuji, and Ambrosia.

### <u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

Sizing remains tight on both coasts, with limited availability of Large, Extra Large, and Jumbo sizes. Smalls and Standards will be more readily available. Overall market conditions are expected to stay elevated due to constrained supply. In Peru, cooler weather is slowing growth, while Mexican production is transitioning from Central Mexico to Baja and Guanajuato, facing challenges from heat and rain. Asparagus supplies are expected to remain tight through the end of August.

### **Avocados**

Peak sizes are currently 48ct and 60ct, with Flora Loca now the primary crop as the old crop has mostly wrapped up. Dry matter is in the mid-20s, compared to the low 30s in the previous crop, which means the new fruit will take longer to ripen. Quality is strong, with very little #2 grade fruit, typical for this time of year. The California season continues to taper off and is expected to finish in a few weeks. Offshore fruit is arriving on both coasts, but those volumes should begin to wind down next month.

### **Bell Peppers**

ALERT

Red bell pepper supplies are extremely tight across California, Mexico, and Canada, with strong demand keeping markets elevated through at least the next two weeks. In contrast, green bell peppers are in ample supply across California, the Midwest, and the Northeast, showing very good quality, while Mexican volumes remain seasonally low. Red bell prices remain high due to ongoing shortages.

Quality is fair, showing typical seasonal softness and scarring due to coastal conditions. Shippers are working to cull compromised fruit. Markets are higher than last summer, driven by strong demand and lower imports. Offshore and Mexican fruit arrivals are light, with Mexico expected to have reduced volume year over year.



Multiple shippers in the Salinas Valley are seeing reduced yields due to INSV, with weights reported between 34-39 pounds. ### **CALIFORNIA**

Moderate high pressure combined with marine layer conditions will keep temperatures near to slightly above average through mid-next week. A low passing just north around Thursday, August 28, will deepen the marine layer, bringing cooler temperatures near to slightly below normal through the end of the month.



### **MEXICO**

Overall, expect mostly seasonal weather through the end of the month, with highs ranging from the mid-70s to mid-80s and lows in the mid-50s to low-60s. Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are likely through August 30, according to the latest forecast trends.



### **FLORIDA**

Warm temperatures with isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected through August 29. Temps will remain mostly above normal, with rainfall near average for late August. Highs will reach the low to mid-90s, with lows in the mid-70s to low 80s across the peninsula. Tropical Storm Eric in the Atlantic is strengthening and moving toward the US, but current models keep it far enough offshore to avoid significant impacts on the mainland.



### ARIZONA

Near to above-normal temperatures are expected next week and likely through the end of August. Models show monsoon moisture and related shower activity remaining mostly over eastern and central Arizona until Monday-Tuesday, August 25-26, when it may shift slightly westward.

# O Prop Updates

### **Crews Rush to Beat the Heat**

A strong stretch of heat is pushing through California this week, and growers are feeling the pressure. From Salinas to Oxnard and the Central Valley, inland temperatures are climbing past 100°F, with some parts of the Central Valley reaching up to 112°F. Harvest crews have adjusted by starting earlier, but field conditions remain tough across nearly every commodity.

Along the coast, we're seeing reduced sizing in broccoli and cauliflower, with an uptick in reports of pin rot and internal defects than usual. Lettuce crops are showing signs of fringe burn, mildew, and light weights. Strawberries are seeing mixed effects. The ongoing heat is helping new season fruit out of Santa Maria and Oxnard, with improvements in size, firmness, and overall quality as those regions ramp up. The high temperatures can cause the tip and sides of the berry to ripen before the top near the calyx, leaving white shoulders. Older plantings still being harvested in Salinas and Watsonville are feeling the strain. We're seeing more bruising and softness as those districts move past their seasonal peak. Over the next few weeks, we'll see Santa Maria and Oxnard reaching their peak as Salinas winds down.

The heat stretch isn't just a California issue. In Mexico, tropical systems and cool nights are slowing tomato ripening and limiting volume. And on the East Coast, Florida growers are keeping a close eye on another potential tropical system. With high humidity and scattered rainfall ahead, greens and herbs could see pressure there as well.

Growers are doing their part to keep products moving and protect crews, and there's still solid availability across most categories. With the back-to-school pull and Labor Day approaching, now's the time to stay close to the field and order for a quicker rotation. And as always, keeping the cold chain intact will go a long way in protecting quality until it ends up on our forks.
