

MARKET ALERTS

Brussel Sprouts: Brussels sprout supplies remain limited due to insect pressure, decay, and smaller sizes in Salinas Valley and Oxnard growing regions.

Pineapple: Thunderstorms in Costa Rica will persist through September, limiting pineapple supplies for the year. Crownless pineapples are in high demand, with weather-related shortages expected. Transportation from Mexico remains stable.

CROP UPDATES

Early signs for the 2025–26 California Navel orange crop are promising, with the USDA projecting 80 million cartons — up 6% from last year. Fruit sizing is trending larger (peaking on 72s and 88s), a shift from last season's smaller sizes. This should create more retail opportunities, especially for bag and bulk programs. Harvest begins in early October, with early picks showing light color but good internal quality. Sizing and volume are expected to improve through mid-December, pointing to a strong, promotable season ahead.

WEATHER

California: The heat wave ends today, with above-average temps inland. A cooling trend with clouds and slight shower chances moves in through the weekend. Friday will be the coolest day before warming returns.

Mexico: Isolated showers continue through the weekend with light rainfall. Temps stay seasonably warm, with highs in the 70s–80s and lows in the mid 50s–low 60s through Sunday.

Florida: Isolated to scattered showers continue south; north Florida sees increased chances this weekend. Warm temps persist, with highs in the mid 80s-low 90s and lows in the 70s.

Arizona: Tropical moisture brings rain and storm chances Wed-Fri, with Thursday most active. Showers taper by weekend, mainly in central AZ. Temps slightly cooler; warm mornings continue.

Apples

September marks the kickoff of the 2025–2026 apple season, with nearly all major varieties beginning to pick and pack new crop this month. Early indicators point to a strong production year for the apple industry, with most varieties expected to match or exceed last year's volumes. Honeycrisp is leading the way, projected to come in over seven million cases above last season — a 64% increase. While it's still too early to determine exact size profiles for every variety, the overall outlook suggests a very favorable supply situation for foodservice this year.

CALIFORNIA

The heat wave ends today, though temperatures will remain above average away from the coast. Morning lows will range from the low 50s to mid 60s, with daytime highs reaching upper 60s to upper 70s near the coast, mid 80s to mid 90s in the coastal valleys, and mid 90s to 103 south of Soledad. An upper low moves into the region tonight, bringing increased cloudiness, cooler temperatures, and a slight chance of showers through the weekend. Friday will be the coolest day, with highs in the mid 60s to low 70s near the coast and upper 70s to upper 80s inland, before a warming trend begins as the low moves out over the weekend.



MEXICO

Shower activity will remain widely isolated through the weekend, with rainfall totals generally between 0.05" and 0.20", though some thunderstorms could bring higher amounts. Temperatures will stay seasonably warm through September 21st, with highs ranging from the low 70s to low 80s through Thursday, mid 70s to mid 80s on Friday, and upper 70s to upper 80s over the weekend. Overnight lows will be in the mid 50s to low 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected mainly across the southern half of the state through the end of the week. Shower chances will increase over northern Florida as we move into the weekend. Temperatures will remain warm over the next five days, with highs in the mid 80s to low 90s and lows ranging from the low to upper 70s through Sunday morning.



ARIZONA

Starting Tuesday evening, scattered plumes of tropical moisture will drift into the low deserts from the south, increasing chances of rain and thunderstorms across the entire forecast area from Wednesday through Friday. Forecast confidence on timing and rainfall totals remains low, as models have shown significant variability. Currently, Thursday appears to have the highest likelihood of thunderstorms with rainfall potentially exceeding ¼". By Saturday and Sunday, any remaining showers should be confined mostly to central Arizona. High temperatures will be a few degrees cooler than average, while morning lows remain warmer than normal through the weekend.



After a season dominated by small fruit, especially during the peak of the Navel window, early signs for the 2025–26 California Navel orange crop are encouraging. This year's crop is expected to increase in both size and volume, with the latest USDA estimate projecting 80 million cartons, a 6% rise over last year.

Early field reports suggest that the size curve is trending larger, with fruit peaking on 72s and 88s. That's a shift from last season, where much of the crop favored 113s and 138s, and leaned heavily toward foodservice. If sizing continues as forecasted, this year's crop will present more promotable opportunities for retail, particularly around bag and bulk programs.



Size distribution is expected to increase as the season progresses, with more consistent, larger fruit by mid-December. Growers will continue evaluating the groves over the next few weeks, but so far, this season is shaping up to be a more balanced and promotable Navel deal.
