

MARKET ALERTS

Strawberries: Supplies are tight as Salinas and Watsonville wind down. Warm nights and rain in Santa Maria are reducing yields. Slight cooling expected this weekend.

Brussels Sprouts: Supplies are limited due to insect pressure, decay, and small sizing in Salinas and Oxnard.

Lemons: Markets remain strong with tight supplies, especially on 140ct and smaller. District 2 is winding down; District 3 just starting. Imports are light, and Mexico's volume is down year over year.

Oranges: Valencias peaking on 72ct with 3 weeks left. School demand is tightening smaller sizes. Navels expected mid-October.

Green Onions: Green onion supplies are tight from Mexico; prices expected to rise next week.

Pineapple: Thunderstorms in Costa Rica limit pineapple supplies through 2025. Crownless pineapples are in high demand. Limited Mexican pineapples available. Expect order changes.

CROP UPDATES

Asparagus supplies are tight after Tropical Storm Mario cut Mexican yields by up to 50% and disrupted logistics. Northern Baja is winding down, and Sonora is starting slowly but expected to run through December. Peru is filling some gaps with strong quality from the south, though freight costs and global demand are limiting U.S. arrivals. Spot markets remain tight but stable, with relief possible as Sonora and Peru ramp up. Read more

WEATHER

California: A midweek upper low brings up to ¼" of rain and cooler temps. Warmer, near- to aboveaverage temps return by the weekend as high pressure builds.

Mexico: Isolated showers midweek will increase Friday-Saturday, with heavier rain possible. Temps stay warm through Thursday, then cool into the weekend.

Florida: Isolated to scattered storms across Central/South Florida; North Florida sees more rain by weekend. Temps rise into the 90s, then cool slightly Sunday. Gusts near 20 mph through Friday.

Arizona: Highs hit 100–105°F midweek, then cool with rising rain chances. Storms likely in central AZ Friday, with flash flood risk; spreading into SE CA and Yuma by the weekend.

FREIGHT

Freight this week continues to inch closer to transition and to the southern growing regions. Product is being spread out across the growing regions creating long loading times for carriers especially out west. Idaho outbound continues to be a struggle with trucks being very tight. CA to FL is also seeing continuing signs of tight truck supply and elevated markets.

Old crop Pink inventories are being stretched as we wait for the new crop to fully color. <u>Asparagus</u>

Tropical Storm Mario cut Mexican asparagus yields by up to 50% in some areas, keeping volumes steady but below expectations. Northern Baja wraps up by mid-October, while Sonora ramps up through December, mostly pre-contracted. Peru offers strong quality, but freight costs and global demand are limiting U.S. supply, keeping spot markets tight.

CALIFORNIA

An upper low will bring a moderate chance of rain and storms Wednesday, with up to ¼" of rain. Temperatures will cool below normal under heavy clouds, with morning lows in the mid-50s to low 60s and daytime highs in the upper 60s to mid-70s near the coast, rising to mid-70s to mid-80s inland. The low moves out Thursday, allowing high pressure and the marine layer to return, bringing near- to above-average temperatures through the weekend.



MEXICO

Shower activity will be isolated Wednesday through Thursday, increasing Friday into Saturday. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.05" to 0.25" through Thursday, with higher amounts expected Friday and Saturday. By Sunday, showers will become much more scattered and isolated.

Temperatures will be seasonably warm through Thursday, then cool down later in the week. Highs will range from the upper 70s to upper 80s on Wednesday, mid-70s to mid-80s Thursday and Friday, and drop to the low 70s to low 80s over the weekend. Lows will stay steady in the upper 50s to mid-60s through Sunday.



FLORIDA

Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected across most of Central and Southern Florida. Northern Florida will see increasing shower activity toward the weekend as a cold front approaches. Highs will range from the upper 80s to low 90s through Thursday, rising to the low-mid 90s Friday into Saturday, then cooling slightly to the mid 80s to low 90s on Sunday. Lows will be in the mid 60s to low 70s in Northern Florida and low to upper 70s in Central and Southern Florida. Winds will gust near or below 20 mph through Friday.



ARIZONA

A brief surge of high pressure will raise daytime highs to 100-105°F across most valleys Wednesday and Thursday, followed by steady cooling into the weekend with increased clouds and rain chances.

An upper-level low off the California coast will move into Arizona by Friday, bringing tropical moisture that may trigger showers and thunderstorms over central Arizona, with possible spread into southeast California Saturday and Yuma Saturday night into Sunday morning.

Central Arizona faces the highest risk of flash flooding and thunderstorms on Friday, with conditions easing somewhat on Saturday.

Asparagus Outlook: Weather Jolts Mexico, Peru Picks Up Slack

What was shaping up to be a strong fall start for asparagus out of Mexico has been tempered by unexpected weather. Tropical Storm Mario brought surprise rainfall across several production regions, especially near Ciudad Constitución, Baja California Sur, resulting in a rapid end to older fields and lower yields on new ones.

Harvest numbers in that area were 35 to 50 percent lower than originally projected and supply was further constrained due to interstate closures. While there was concern that this might result in a sudden flush of product, Mexican import volume has remained relatively steady but lower than projections.

In Northern Baja California, the season continues to wind down, with most shippers expecting to finish by the second week of October. Sizing in this region is still leaning standard and large, with limited small, extra-large, and jumbo packs.

Further east, early fields are beginning to harvest near Sonoyta and Hermosillo, Sonora, although slower than expected. These areas also saw some rainfall from Tropical Storm Mario, but growers are still assessing any potential impact. If conditions hold, Sonora will produce through December and help stabilize fall supply. Much of this product is already committed to contracts, which could keep the spot market tighter than usual through October and November.

In Peru, most of the volume bound for the U.S. is coming from the Ica region in the south, where growing conditions have been ideal. Quality is excellent, with firm tips and clean spears. The La Libertad region in northern Peru is also harvesting, but cooler temperatures and cloudy skies are slowing progress. The northern crop is expected to peak between late November and January, which will align well with Caborca's season in Mexico.

While supply is gradually improving, high demand and elevated freight costs are still influencing how much Peruvian product arrives in the U.S. Some product is being diverted to other global markets due to stronger pricing and air freight premiums, especially from competing commodities like blueberries.

Looking ahead, asparagus supply will be sufficient heading into the holiday push, but availability will depend on how quickly Sonora builds steam and whether Peru's northern region can hit its forecasted volumes. For now, sizing and quality are strong, and pricing is showing signs of relief.
