

#### **MARKET ALERTS**

Asparagus: Mexican asparagus is tight due to demand and weather, with Baja down and Sonora stabilizing by mid-October. Peru's vessel issues cause delays. Demand stays strong short-term but supply should ease by mid-month.

Strawberries: Supplies are limited after last week's weather but should improve slightly by week's end. Oxnard production will increase in the coming weeks.

Broccoli: Supplies are tight due to pin-rot and insect pressure. Market expected to firm next week.

Brussels Sprouts: Supplies are limited due to insect pressure, decay, and smaller sizes in Salinas and Oxnard.

Cauliflower: Supplies are limited; market expected to rise slightly next week.

Celery: Market active north and south; large sizes, especially 24 counts, are tight. Slight seeder reported, but quality is above average. Supplies moderate to light this week.

Lemons: Markets strong; Ventura/Oxnord volume declining. Small sizes (140ct and under) limited. CA Desert/AZ starting light. Demand up, imports down vs. last year. Offshore and Mexico volume light.

**Oranges:** Valencias peak on 72ct with 3 weeks left. School demand up, tightening smaller sizes and raising prices. Navels start mid-October.

### **CROP UPDATES**

Salinas harvest is winding down with quality slipping due to recent rain, humidity, and temperature swings. Iceberg, romaine, and broccoli face disease, insect pressure, and lower yields. Yuma had early rain damage, and Huron's limited harvest looks promising. Weather challenges call for flexible harvest and close monitoring.

#### **WEATHER**

**California:** Light rain chances remain as the low exits Wednesday with cool temps. High pressure builds Thursday, warming to near or above normal by Saturday.

**Mexico:** Isolated showers possible this weekend; most areas stay dry. Temps seasonably warm, highs in 70s-80s, lows mid-50s-60s.

Florida: Humberto and Imelda in the Atlantic are moving east, away from the US coast, with no major Florida impacts expected. Showers will increase this weekend with seasonal temps—highs mid-80s to low 90s, lows mid-60s to mid-70s. Winds gust 15-25 mph midweek.

Arizona: Temps near normal through weekend with highs in 90s; upper 90s in parts of AZ and SE CA Thu-Fri. Lows mid-60s to low 80s, cooling by Sunday. Winds shift from light southerly to gusty NW Friday, then lighter northerly.

Reds, Fujis, and Pinks remain on the tighter side as old crop inventories continue to wind down, while Gala, Honeycrisp, Granny Smith, and Goldens show strong availability with supplies improving steadily each week. Cooler nights in Yakima, dipping into the high 40s and low 50s, are enhancing color development particularly benefiting Reds, Fujis, and Pinks.

### Lettuce Iceberg

Demand continues to outpace supply for at least two weeks due to reduced yields caused by INSV and high heat. Industry-wide, lighter weights and puffiness are common, with leaf discoloration, internal burn, and misshapen heads appearing on arrivals. Pricing on all value-added lettuce items has escalated accordingly.

# Weather Updates



# **CALIFORNIA**

As the low exits the region Wednesday, light rain chances remain with near to below-average temperatures. Morning lows will range from the mid-40s to low 60s, with daytime highs in the mid-60s to mid-70s near the coast and mid-70s to mid-80s inland. High pressure builds Thursday, gradually warming temperatures to near or slightly above normal by Saturday—low 60s to low 80s near the coast and low to mid-80s south of Soledad.



# **MEXICO**

Isolated showers are possible through the weekend, with most areas expected to stay dry. Rainfall totals will range from 0.05" to 0.30", with higher amounts possible in thunderstorms. Temperatures will remain seasonably warm, with highs in the low 70s to low 80s and lows in the mid-50s to low 60s through Sunday.



# **FLORIDA**

Humberto and Imelda are both in the Atlantic. Imelda is closer to the southeast US but both are expected to be ushered eastward, away from the US coast. No major impacts to the state of Florida are anticipated. Otherwise shower activity will increase over the region as we move into and through the weekend. Temps will be more seasonal but wetter over the next five days. Highs in the mid to low 90s on Wednesday and low-upper 80s for Thursday through Sunday over most of the state. Lows in the mid 60s to mid 70s through the weekend. Winds will gust near 15 mph on Wed and closer to 25 mph on Thursday and Friday over a good portion of the state.



# **ARIZONA**

Temperatures will stay near seasonal normals through the weekend under a moderate high-pressure ridge. Highs will be in the low to mid-90s across most valleys, with some upper 90s in central Arizona and southeast California Thursday and Friday. Morning lows will range from the mid-60s to low 80s through Friday, cooling to the low to mid-60s by Sunday. Winds shift from slight southerly Wednesday and Thursday to stronger northwesterly gusts of 20-25 mph Friday, then weaken and turn northerly Saturday and Sunday.

# Grop Updates

### Field Quality Slips as Salinas Winds Down

As a Salinas Valley native, this time of year is one of my favorites. Warm evenings, cool mornings, and golden sunrises over the hills are what make fall here so special. But even with the beautiful weather, it's also a signal that the growing season is winding down, and this year, it's shaping up to be one of the more challenging finishes we've seen in a while. Recent rainfall, elevated humidity, and wide swings in daytime temperatures have made things tough in the fields. Iceberg markets jumped sharply after harvests were delayed or skipped due to muddy rows. Some growers are cutting heads earlier than usual to stay ahead of breakdown, which is leading to lighter boxes and inconsistent cartons at the cooler. The heat that followed the rain has only added to the pressure, with diseases like INSV and Sclerotinia showing up in both inland and coastal fields.




Romaine and green leaf lettuce are also feeling the stress. Plants are showing more outer leaf damage, mildew, and signs of weaker structure. Crews are trimming more aggressively at harvest to maintain quality, but that means lower yields and less visually perfect product. Broccoli and cauliflower are dealing with similar challenges. Insect pressure is increasing, especially from diamondback moths and aphids, and pin rot is becoming more common. Post-harvest, value-added shelf life is taking a hit, even with proper handling, as the raw product is just more vulnerable in these conditions.

Looking ahead, the forecast for Salinas is mostly sunny with cool mornings, but we may see some drizzle midweek. While it doesn't sound like much, even light moisture can keep plant surfaces wet for longer and raise the risk of mildew or decay, especially when paired with warm afternoons.



Meanwhile, Yuma experienced some rain in early September, which caused localized flooding and damage to some first plantings. It's still too early to fully gauge the impact, but the desert transition could be a little bumpier than normal as we move through November. We'll have a clearer picture once the stands mature and crews begin prepping fields later this month.

The Huron district is expected to begin harvesting in mid-October. While production there is more limited than in Salinas, early field reports are positive. Quality is looking strong on the handful of items grown there, which could offer a helpful bridge as Salinas winds down and the fall transition begins.
