

Mexico's uncertainty. Miami arrivals are back on schedule for Thanksgiving.

Blackberries: This item is rising due to weather-driven demand and is filling shortages across row crops and berries.

Blueberries: Markets firm; fewer Peruvian containers. Central Mexico volume rising; light Argentine berries arriving in Florida.

Raspberries: Like blackberries, this item's up on weatherdriven demand and fills shortages across crops and berries

Strawberries: Demand exceeds supply; CA rain halts harvests. Santa Maria past peak; Oxnard slow to improve. Production gap until Central Mexico in 2 weeks; Baja 4-6 weeks out. Tight fill rates, limited open market fruit for 3-4

Broccoli: Supplies limited; pin-rot affects yields. Insect control key. Market expected to rise next week.

Brussel Sprouts: Supplies very limited due to insect pressure, decay, and small sizing in Salinas and Oxnard.

Cauliflower: Supplies tight due to quality and insect issues; market to stay high.

Lemons: Markets strong; District 1 light harvest starting; District 3 tapering; small sizes tight; Mexico shipping via

Limes: Storm Priscilla halts harvests, tightens supplies, raises prices; large fruit dominates, small scarce.

Oranges: Valencias nearly done; navels start light next week, delayed by rain. Cooler nights aid color. Sizes 72/88/113ct; mandarins begin soon.

Lettuce (iceberg): Demand outpaces supply; prices high. INSV causes shortages and quality issues. Huron production starting, improving over 3-4 weeks.

Lettuce Leaf: Light supplies on romaine and leaf; romaine hearts scarce for 2+ weeks. Prices escalated. Huron production starting, volumes rising next week. Cantaloupes: Westside ending; shift to Brawley/Yuma delayed by rain. Limited supply, rising demand, mostly 9s

# **OCTOBER 15, 2025**

#### **CROP UPDATES**

Rain and humidity in Salinas are causing harvest delays, lower yields, and quality issues, especially in leafy greens and broccoli. The desert transition begins mid-November, with early Yuma quality looking strong. Huron offers limited relief. Strawberries remain tight, and small citrus sizes are scarce. Flexibility and communication with shippers are essential. Read more

#### **WEATHER**

California: Light showers taper off Wednesday as skies clear and temps gradually warm. Highs rise from 60s-70s midweek to 80s by the weekend. A slight chance of rain returns Sunday night with cooler temps early next week.

Mexico: Temps warm into the 70s-80s through the weekend with lows in the 50s-60s. Mostly dry, with isolated showers possible through Oct 19.

Florida: Florida stays dry through Saturday, with isolated showers possible Sunday. Highs in the 80s, lows in the 50s-60s north and 60s south. Gusty winds in the south and Tampa Bay.

Arizona: A dry front cools the low deserts Wednesday, with highs in the 70s and lows in the 50s. Temps warm to the 80s by Sunday; Wenden may hit upper 40s Thursday and Friday.

#### **FREIGHT**

FREIGHT this week continues to see challenges from Idaho in the Pacific Northwest with the shortage of trucks. Expect changing in growing regions and fall loading to create delays with trucks loading on the West Coast. Advance booking and preparation is highly encouraged.



Pineapples: Costa Rica storms limit pineapples through year-end. High demand for crownless. Mexican pineapples limited but good quality. Expect substitutions and cancellations..

Squash: Western markets high; NC light; Northeast ending; Georgia slowed, prices firm.

Tomatoes: Markets up; CA rounds done; Baja rain slows; Quincy strong; Roma short; grapes limited, quality down.

### **Apples**

October may present challenges for securing food service size apples. Near-perfect weather in September promoted continued growth, and varieties like Gala and Granny Smith have sized up significantly. While later harvests could show some variation, current projections suggest that 125s and 138s will be less abundant than typically expected from a crop of this volume.

#### <u>Asparagus</u>

ALERT

Tropical storms in Mexico have cut asparagus production to about 50%, pushing prices higher and increasing demand for Peruvian supply. Peru is shifting from southern to northern regions, with strong volumes expected by early December—just in time to offset Mexico's uncertain outlook. Miami arrivals are back on track ahead of Thanksgiving.

#### **Berries (Strawberries)**

We're in a demand-exceeds-supply market as rain in California has halted harvests, with growers stripping fields and delaying picks. Santa Maria is past peak, and while Oxnard is expected to improve slowly, more rain is forecast for Sunday and Monday. A significant production gap is expected until Central Mexico ramps up in about two weeks, with Baja still 4 to 6 weeks out. Fill rates will remain tight, and open market fruit will be extremely limited over the next 3 to 4 weeks.

Demand continues to outpace supplies and is expected to do so for at least the next few weeks. Pricing on value-added products remains elevated, especially on the second tier. INSV is the primary cause of product shortages in the Salinas Valley, leading to lighter weights, misshapen heads, and puffiness reported by all suppliers. Production has started in Huron this week and is expected to strengthen over the next three to four weeks.

# Weather Updates



### **CALIFORNIA**

As the low moves out Wednesday, a few light showers will linger with minimal rainfall before skies clear and temperatures gradually warm. Morning lows will range from the mid to upper 30s south of King City to the mid 40s and low 50s near the coast. Wednesday's highs will be in the low 60s to low 70s, rising to the upper 60s to mid 80s by the weekend. The next storm system arrives Sunday night, bringing a slight chance of rain and near to slightly below-average temperatures early next week.



### **MEXICO**

Temperatures will warm slightly in the latter half of the week, with highs ranging from the low 70s to low 80s through Friday and mid 70s to mid 80s over the weekend. Lows will stay in the low 50s to near 60 through Sunday morning. Isolated showers are possible through October 19, but overall, mostly dry weather is expected.



### **FLORIDA**

High pressure will keep the Florida peninsula dry through Saturday. By Sunday, as high pressure shifts offshore, more humid air will arrive, bringing a chance of a few isolated showers.

Northern Florida will see highs in the low to mid 80s and lows from the mid 50s to low 60s through the weekend. Central and Southern Florida will experience highs in the low to upper 80s with lows ranging from the low to upper 60s. Winds will gust between 15 and 22 mph across most of Southern Florida and the Tampa Bay area.



## **ARIZONA**

A mostly dry cold front will move through the low deserts early Wednesday, bringing morning lows down to the low 50s to low 60s, with afternoon highs reaching the 70s in most valleys. Dry conditions and a daytime warming trend will begin Wednesday. Highs will rise to the mid to upper 80s by Sunday, but minimum temperatures will recover slowly, staying mostly in the 50s through the weekend. Wenden is expected to dip to the mid to upper 40s on Thursday and Friday.

We're officially in the home stretch of the Salinas season, with most shippers expecting to transition to the desert the week of November 17 fully. That still gives us a few more weeks in the Valley, but conditions in the field are deteriorating quickly. This week's inch-and-a-half of rain, combined with lingering heat and humidity, has only added to the already high pressure from disease and pests.

Earlier this week, the Salinas Valley saw roughly 1.5 inches of rain fall across key growing areas. That amount of moisture, paired with lingering humidity and warm afternoons, is putting additional stress on already fragile fields. Harvest delays, muddy rows, and damage to tender crops are all contributing to lighter yields and inconsistent supply. Even short disruptions like this can ripple through the system when availability is already tight.

Harvest crews are trimming heavily to maintain quality, especially in iceberg, romaine, and green leaf. Yields are down, weights are light, and most lots require extra attention at the cooler. The same holds for broccoli and cauliflower, where disease pressure, insect activity, and pin rot continue to chip away at volume. Even where the product looks fine on arrival, shelf life can be hitor-miss, especially on value-added items. The window to make a clean pack is getting narrower by the day.

Meanwhile, the desert is prepping to take over. While Yuma did see some rain in early September and October, most growers were able to adjust plantings. Early reports suggest the stands are a bit uneven in spots, but overall quality is expected to be good with fewer pest and disease challenges than what we've been seeing in Salinas. That said, early-season quirks, but quality and labor-related, will likely show up once harvest begins.

Huron harvest is underway and will offer some short-term relief on leaf items. Early quality reports are strong, but volume is limited and mostly focused on romaine and green leaf.

On the fruit side, strawberries remain tight. Santa Maria and Oxnard growers continue to cull rain-damaged fruit, and overall quality remains a concern with bruising, mildew, and softness showing up. Salinas and Watsonville are on the way out, and we'll be leaning on Baja and Mexico for the next cycle when they start up in November.

Citrus markets are still active. Small-sized fruit remains tight as schools continue to pull on 113s and 138s. Early California Navels are starting to ship, and the size profile is trending larger than last season, which should be a win for retail promotions as we head toward winter.

It's a tricky time of year to navigate, but the key is staying flexible and staying close to your shippers. Whether it's a romaine spec, a strawberry sub, or a lighter-than-normal iceberg box, having the right expectations on the front end will go a long way in keeping orders moving. More than ever, it's about tight turns, good communication, and trusting your suppliers to help you make the best calls for your customers.
