Commodity of the Month - Apples

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexican asparagus supplies remain very limited, with high prices and only gradual improvement expected. Peruvian supplies are increasing, but overall availability remains tight.

Cauliflower: Cauliflower supplies remain extremely tight due to production gaps and pest pressure, with limited availability and a firm market expected to continue.

Citrus (Limes): Mexico lime supplies are tightening, with smaller sizes dominating and larger fruit becoming scarce. Pricing is expected to remain firm through October.

Citrus (Oranges): California Valencias continue to peak on larger sizes, while small sizes remain extremely limited. Flexibility on size is needed, with 72ct and 88ct fruit recommended to support supply.

Green Onion: Baja supplies remain extremely limited due to heat and lower yields, keeping the market firm. Improvement is not expected until fall production begins in October.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Lettuce supplies remain tight due to lower yields and disease pressure, with quality concerns and stronger markets expected to continue.

Lettuce Leaf: Romaine supplies remain strong with good availability, improved quality, and steady market conditions. Demand is light, creating promotional opportunities.

Onions: Storage onions are driving the market, with tight supplies and larger sizes remaining hard to source. Freight costs continue to keep pricing elevated.

Pineapple: Pineapple supplies are tightening, with open-market fruit and larger crownless sizes remaining limited. Quality is good, while 6ct and 7ct crowned supplies are improving.

Potatoes: New-crop potatoes are shipping, but sizing remains tight, especially on select counts. Washington quality is strong, while sweet potato supplies remain limited.

Squash: Squash supplies remain tight, especially yellow squash, while zucchini availability has improved slightly. Quality is mixed due to weather impacts.

CROP UPDATES

California's Valencia season is winding down as attention shifts to Navels. The initial USDA forecast projects the 2026-27 California Navel crop at 84 million cartons, slightly above last season, with improved fruit set and similar sizing. First shipments are expected in mid-to-late October, supporting a smooth seasonal transition. While not an oversized crop, increased production should provide better availability and more consistent supply than last season's tight Valencia market, particularly on smaller sizes. WEATHER

California: Cooler temperatures are expected through Thursday, followed by a warming trend with near to above-normal temperatures into the weekend.

Florida: Warm temperatures continue through Sunday, with scattered Florida showers and storms.

Mexico: Central Mexico will see mostly dry conditions with light, isolated showers and seasonable temperatures through the weekend.

Arizona: Central Arizona faces heavy rain and storm risk through Wednesday, followed by warmer, drier conditions into the weekend.

Apples

New-crop apple harvest continues to build momentum, with Galas and Honeycrisp now well underway and Granny Smith and Golds following closely behind. Reds and Fujis are nearing the market, while Pink Lady harvest is still ahead. Most varieties remain steady, with prices holding at elevated levels for the time being.

Asparagus

ALERT

Mexican asparagus remains very limited, though increased open-market offerings suggest availability may improve slightly in the coming weeks. Prices remain high as weather and low yields continue to constrain production in Baja and Sonora, while Hermosillo output begins to increase. Peruvian supply is gradually improving in the South, with Chinchá and Ica producing above projections and reporting good quality, while Northern Peru continues to face weather-related pressure and declining yields. Strong global demand and the upcoming December–February transition are expected to keep U.S. supplies challenging.

Carrots

The main crop has now transitioned to the Cuyama/Lancaster growing region, which is expected to continue through the month of October. Availability is strong, with good overall quality. Grimmway has also started running their Minnesota region, and we anticipate running this program through the end of November/early December. We will be offering the following SKUs from this facility. This is the first year operating out of the Minnesota facility, and for the time being, we will only be shipping the SKUs listed below from this location. Pricing will remain the same as California.

ALERT

Cauliflower supplies remain very tight as production for most suppliers have gapped. Heavy Diamondback Moth pressure, especially in South County and Santa Maria, continues to severely impact yields. Warm weather is adding to field challenges, with little improvement expected. Some suppliers may need to source outside product to fill orders. Expect limited supplies and a difficult market to continue.

ALERT

Mexico lime supplies are tightening as production transitions to new growing regions, with hot weather expected to limit volume through October. Pricing is expected to remain firm, with larger sizes becoming increasingly scarce. The crop is currently peaking on 200s, 230s, and 250s, while new-region fruit is sizing primarily to 175s, 200s, and 230s.

ALERT

The California Valencia orange crop continues to peak on larger sizes, primarily 56ct and 72ct fruit. Small sizes, especially 113ct and 138ct, remain extremely limited and are expected to stay tight through the remainder of the season. To help ensure consistent supply, flexibility on size and grade will be necessary, with substitutions to larger-size Valencias likely required. Suppliers are maintaining contract size averages while managing overall availability. Schools and DoD programs are encouraged to accept 88ct or 72ct fruit whenever possible to support order fulfillment.

Lettuce Iceberg

ALERT

An industry-wide shortage continues to impact lettuce supplies, with lower yields reported in both the Salinas Valley and Santa Maria. INSV remains a major contributor to the shortage, limiting availability and putting added pressure on shippers. Quality concerns include discoloration, misshapen heads, and insect damage, with weights ranging from 37-44 lbs. Expect tight supplies and a strengthening market throughout the week. Shortages, in some cases, forcing grower/shippers to purchase acreage and/or finished product.

ALERT

Romaine availability remains good, with moderate supplies of romaine hearts and lighter demand creating strong promotional opportunities. Shippers have additional flexibility to support ad programs, increase movement, and pursue new business. Disease pressure remains light, while green and red leaf conditions have improved in the Salinas Valley and Southern California. Supplies remain below budget, but availability should remain favorable, with the market expected to hold steady in the mid-to-high teens.

Pineapple supplies continue to tighten due to the natural flowering season. Contract orders are expected to remain covered, but open-market availability will be more limited. Quality remains good overall. On the crownless side, 8ct and 10ct fruit remain very tight, with organic pineapples also in short supply. For crowned fruit, supplies of 6ct and 7ct sizes are improving, while 8ct availability remains steady.

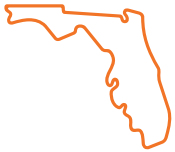
CALIFORNIA

A trough moving through the region Wednesday will deepen the marine layer, bringing near to slightly below-average temperatures through Thursday. Morning lows will range from the low 40s to mid-50s, while daytime highs reach the mid-60s to mid-70s along the coast and upper 70s to mid-80s south of Soledad. High pressure building to the east on Friday will support a warming trend, with temperatures rising to near or slightly above normal through the weekend.



MEXICO

Shower activity across Central Mexico is expected to remain light and isolated, resulting in mostly dry growing conditions through the weekend. Temperatures will stay seasonally warm, with highs in the low 70s to low 80s and overnight lows ranging from the low 50s to low 60s.



FLORIDA

Warm temperatures will persist through Sunday, with highs in the upper 80s to low 90s and overnight lows in the low to mid-70s. Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected across the Florida Peninsula over the next five days, with rain chances increasing into the weekend. Most areas can expect 0.05" to 0.30" of rainfall, though higher amounts are possible with stronger storms. Winds will reach 20-25 mph through Thursday before easing to around 15 mph on Friday across Southeast Florida and the Tampa Bay region.



ARIZONA

An upper-level trough moving in from the northwest will bring increased instability and moisture to central Arizona, creating a high risk of thunderstorms and heavy rainfall through late Wednesday. Rainfall rates may exceed 0.50" per hour near Phoenix before conditions improve and rain chances diminish by Thursday morning. Temperatures will remain seasonal through Thursday, with highs in the 90s to low 100s, followed by a gradual warming trend into the weekend with highs reaching the low to mid-100s. Overnight lows will range from the mid-70s to low 80s, settling into the 70s through the weekend.

Crop Updates



A Fresh Look at Navels

Fall is officially here. While iceberg, broccoli and cauliflower are still sitting high on our watch list, it's a good time to turn our attention to another seasonal change happening in produce.

We're getting close to the end of California's Valencia orange season, and for the first time we have a pretty good look at what the upcoming Navel crop may have in store.

The first USDA estimate puts the 2026-27 California Navel crop at 84 million cartons, up slightly from the 82 million cartons produced last season. Fruit set is also up about 3%, while average fruit size is almost identical to last year. On paper, that's a pretty encouraging start.

For most of the summer, the story on Valencias has been size. Small fruit, especially 113s and 138s, has been difficult to come by, and school demand quickly exposed just how limited that part of the crop was. The hope with Navels is that a slightly larger crop gives us a little more breathing room and better availability across the size profile.

We're expecting the first California Navels to begin shipping around mid to late October. That timing should line up pretty well with the end of the Valencia season and, assuming the crop develops as expected, give us a smoother transition into fall and winter citrus.





Crop Updates



The 84-million-carton forecast is larger than last year, but it's not an unusually large crop. Looking back at the historical numbers, California has produced crops north of 90 million cartons in several previous seasons, so this looks more like a healthy crop than an oversupplied one.

That should be good news for both sides of the market. More fruit should help improve availability and give foodservice, fresh-cut and grab-and-go programs a little more consistency, while overall production still looks reasonable enough to keep the market from becoming overly heavy.

There's still plenty of fruit left to grow between now and the first meaningful Navel harvest, and the early pack-outs will tell us a lot more about where the sizes actually land. But after a Valencia season where small fruit has been one of the biggest challenges, a slightly bigger Navel crop is a welcome way to start fall.
